Notus School District is committed to adhering to the district's mission and vision. NSD Administration and teaching staff are committed to provide varied learning opportunities along with high quality education that will ensure the safety of our students, staff, and community. It is our goal to mitigate risk and minimize the spread of COVID-19. It is important students, staff, and parents do their part and follow health guidance at school and in the community. Everyone needs to monitor their health and stay home if they are feeling sick or showing symptoms of COVID-19.

We have developed the following plan and strategies for Return to School. The plan provides a tiered approach with clear, actionable steps that are advisable before students and employees return back to school on August 16, 2021, along with guidance that is applicable for the 2021-2022 school year.

This is a fluid/living document and will be updated according to recommendations and guidance of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Governor's office, State Board of Education, State Department of Education, State Board of Education Idaho High School Activities Association, Idaho department of Health and Welfare, Southwest District Health, and other federal, state, and local officials. It is designed to help prioritize the health and safety of students and staff as they return to school. The most recent version of this framework will be posted on the Notus SD website (www.notusschools.org); it will list the version number and date of update. The Notus SD Board of Trustees will have the final say in the category under which the district will operate.

How COVID-19 Spreads:

COVID-19 is mainly spread by respiratory droplets. When someone infected coughs, sneezes, or speaks, respiratory droplets that contain the virus are expelled and can be breathed in by someone nearby. The virus cannot enter the body through the skin, the droplets can get into your airways or mucous membranes of your eyes, nose, or mouth to infect you. The virus can spread if you touch a contaminated surface then touch your eyes, nose, or mouth.

When a student or staff member becomes ill at school:

When a student or staff member develops any symptoms of illness consistent with COVID -19 in school:

- Isolate the person in a separate room while they wait to be picked up or until they are able to leave the facility on their own. Ensure they have hygiene supplies, including a cloth face covering, tissue, and alcohol-based hand sanitizer
- Remind those monitoring the sick person to wear a face mask and practice physical distancing.
- Close off the area used for isolation after the ill person leaves. Wait for as long as possible after they leave to clean/disinfect the area. Open outside doors/windows to increase air circulation in the area.
- Clean and disinfect all areas used by the person who is sick; high touch surfaces, and items they have touched
- Wear gloves when cleaning; wash hands after removing gloves

Procedures for Returning to School After COVID-19 Testing or A Family Member has tested positive for COVID-19:

- Anyone who is experience COVID-19 symptoms should stay home until they receive a diagnosis. If the diagnosis is **positive** they should stay home for 10 days and monitor their health for 14 days. If the test is **negative**, they should remain home until all of their symptoms are gone, without medication for 24 hours. (Guidance will be provided by SWDH and/or personal health care providers regarding protocols.)
- A COVID-19 positive patient must remain in quarantine until the health authority releases them.
- In K-12 instruction areas where there is close contact (close contact as defined by CDC and SWDH, is within 6 feet for 15 minutes or longer over a 24-hour period) between a person who has tested positive or is diagnosed with, COVID-19 (case) and student or staff (contact), and both persons were wearing masks, covering the nose and mouth, during the time physical distancing could not be maintained:
 - Those exposed may attend in-person classes but must monitor themselves closely for COVID-19 symptoms for two weeks. If they develop symptoms they should stay home and contact a health care provider.
- If they were not wearing a mask:
 - Those that were in close contact (close contact as defined by CDC and SWDH, is within 6 feet for 15 minutes or longer over a 24-hour period) will be contacted and sent home to isolate for 10 days or 7 days and then test for COVID-19 on or

after the 8th day per CDC guidelines. If negative they may return to school while wearing a mask until the 14th day has passed.

If the confirmed cases are greater than 5% of the school's population, or if the schools probable cases are greater than 1/3, the school building will close for an amount of time (Length TBD) and distance learning will be implemented. The district will work with local health officials to assess the situation and take proper steps in order to reopen.

- Local health officials' recommendations for the scope and duration of school closures will be made on a case-by-case basis.
 - During school closure, extracurricular group activities, school-based afterschool programs, and large events will be modified, canceled, or postponed.
 - During school closure, school facilities will be disinfected according to CDC and local public health officials' guidance.
 - During school closure, Red category Level 3 practices will be implemented (transition to Remote Learning)
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- ✓ If at any time staff absences are greater than the number of substitutes for a building, that building will transition to remote learning or emergency closure.
 - ✓ Plans may be changed or revised by the superintendent through the advisement of the board, based on most current information.

Definitions

Face Covering - District employees and students may be required to wear a face mask/covering depending on the COVID spread level. Information will be provided on proper use, removal, and washing of cloth face coverings [CDC Guidance](#)

Clean/Disinfect - Ensure safe and correct use of sanitizer and disinfectant [CDC Guidance](#)

Hand Hygiene - Hand soap and water are the first recommendations for hand hygiene. Hand soap and water should be used, when possible, especially for younger children. Hand sanitizer should contain 60% alcohol and only be used by staff and children who understand how to safely use hand sanitizer. [CDC Guidance](#)

PPE - Personal protective equipment that is used to decrease exposure to disease causing organisms. Examples: Face mask/covering, face shield, hand sanitizer, gloves, aprons, desk dividers, etc. Other protective measures are: handwashing with soap and water, using tissues and discarding promptly, and maintaining six feet of distance.

Definitions


Isolation - Isolation keeps someone who is sick and/or confirmed positive for COVID-19 or tested positive and has no symptoms (asymptomatic) away from others, even in their own home. Isolation should continue until at least 10 days since symptoms first appeared, date of testing if positive for COVID-19, symptoms are improved, and NO fever without fever-reducing medication for a minimum of 24 hours. Quarantine - Quarantine keeps someone who has been in close contact with someone who has COVID-19 away from others. A quarantine should be for 10 days after your last contact with the infected person; monitoring for symptoms for a total of 14 days. If a COVID test is taken with a negative result after 5 days of last exposure quarantine may be reduced to 7 days with monitoring for 14 days. Temperature should be checked twice daily and monitored for symptoms. Contact health care provider if fever or other symptoms occur during quarantine.
